

No Tear Drops for Anthony

Hazlehurst, Mississippi is a small southern town centralized in the middle of the state of Mississippi. It is popularized by its neighboring geographic, and bleak economic southern history. Recently, this small town improved its over crowded health facility that better serves its population of some five thousand, or more, residents. To this end, on a mid-day afternoon of October 23, 2024, as Anthony Earl Smith lay almost lifeless in this small facility, shadowed by his medical team, the small town recorder in Hazlehurst, went into action. After struggling for several hours, and as his heart weakened, Anthony may have felt the loosing of the hands of his medical team at the center of his heart; and, he may have heard them whisper: "HE DIDN'T MAKE IT." However, this was the third generation of black men's tragic ending in Hazlehurst: Anthony's father (Sammy Earl Smith) took this exit close to two decades ago. His father's father, (R. T. Smith), took this same exit, and his father'sfather, (Grand Pa William) was the first of this known generation to take this exit. Anthony, like his immediate male forebears, maxed the national statistics for black men who lose their heart's strength, and leave their bodies weakened, way too soon.


Anthony Earl was born in Hazlehurst, Mississippi to the young and proud parents of Samuel (Sammy) Earl Smith and Barbara Jean Mitchell Smith on August 4, 1962. He grew up under the care, love and spiritual tutelage of his parents, his extended family, and his grandmothers: Thelma Daniels Smith (Mt. Sinai United Methodist Church), and Mabel Barnes Mitchell (St. James Missionary Baptist Church). All levels of his early education were gained through the Hazlehurst School System. His higher education learning was achieved at Copiah-Lincoln Community College and Jackson State University. He chose a career in Computer Technology, and worked close to thirty years within the Hazlehurst City School District where he helped build, and stabilized, the computer program until his retirement. Anthony was truly a community servant with a continuous big smile and a heart as good as gold. He was a tremendous asset to his Hazlehurst High School Class of 1980, where they modeled a program of love, sharing, and commitment of personal and community service among the needs within their small community. While Anthony had no biological siblings, he was significant in building family structure among his large body of maternal and paternal cousins, and friends. His aunt, Nola, and he, designed a sister/brother relationship that was a long-life bond. Upon Nola's illness. Anthony became her total caretaker which ended only at his death. His two male cousins, Capree Smith (Dekalb, IL) and Stephen Ruff II (Atlanta, GA) communicated as a strong brotherhood fraternity. Aligning with Hazlehurst High School Class of 1980, his father's sisters: Dr. Bettye J. Parker Smith (Atlanta, GA), Ms. Shirley Ruth Smith (Atlanta, GA), Alma Vaught (Atlanta, GA) and Mrs. Vavolyn Diane Ruff (Atlanta, GA)/Pastor Stephen Ruff), accepted adult parental responsibility for Anthony's care and well-being, in the absence of his parents. Considering the events of October 23, 2024, we weep because we love him; we are joyful because he left his heart with us; therefore, "NO TEAR DROPS FOR ANTHONY!"
